

The Definition

It is a fundamental concept in the study of gender and human rights.

It refers to the way various social identities—such as race, gender, social class, religion, and others—intersect and interact to create unique and complex experiences of discrimination and oppression.





The Definition

It is a social theory that examines how various social systems and structures can create complex and multifaceted experiences of injustice and discrimination.

This theory suggests that individuals can face discrimination based on the intersection of multiple social identities, rather than solely on a single identity.






The Definition


